The Morgan Art of Papermaking Conservatory and Educational Foundation is the largest arts center in the United States, dedicated to every facet of papermaking, book arts, and letterpress printing as well as to cultivating the talents of established and emerging artists. An international destination that is free and open to the public, The Morgan Conservatory is a working studio, gallery, gathering place for the community, educational hub, and purveyor of some of the finest handmade papers in the world.

Since opening to the public in 2008, The Morgan has been a rising star in the Cleveland arts community and the papermaking world. The Morgan's 15,000-square-foot converted industrial space is home to professional and aspiring artists who are dedicated to the ancient art of papermaking, book arts, and letterpress printing. The Morgan has been transformed into an art facility with studios, an 85' double-wall gallery, a space for community events, and a unique kozo garden that was established to sustainably grow fiber for Eastern papers.

Morgan Equitable Artist Fund

The Morgan Equitable Artist Fund-made possible by the generosity of our community and seed funding from the Cyrus Eaton Foundation-provides full scholarships to aspiring, emerging, and established artists for papermaking, bookbinding, and printmaking workshops. The Fund was designed to expand creative programming for underrepresented artists, further encourage paper and book arts locally, and reflect the diversity of our community, with scholarships available for in-person as well as virtual workshops. Each of our workshops is developed by teaching artists to provide opportunities to learn craft traditions and techniques in an environment that fosters creativity and supports participants who want to learn new or advance existing skill sets. Introductory Level Workshops

Intro Level Workshops are designed specifically for those who are new to the fields of hand papermaking, letterpress printing, and the art of the book. These workshops focus on building knowledge and introductory skills within The Morgan's studio areas. Although very few of our workshops require prior experience, we know it can be helpful to dip your toes into the (pulpy) water before deep diving into more advanced techniques. Intro Level Workshops are a great way to start or continue your learning journey at The Morgan Art of Papermaking Conservatory and Educational Foundation.

Professional Development Series

The Morgan Conservatory is unveiling a new series of workshops geared specifically to the professional side of the art world. Learn how to promote artwork, write an artist statement, frame artwork, apply for a residency or grant, etc. These workshops will support artists/participants as they work to find success in their trade.

In-Person Workshops | PAPERMAKING



Intro to Western Papermaking

Taught by Ryan Cermak

January 25 | 10:00-4:00 | \$100

During this introductory workshop, participants will be introduced to Western hand papermaking's history and basics, from processing fibers in the beater to drying and cleaning up in the studio. Participants will look at different types of fiber, discuss their physical properties and how to process them, and learn about the types of paper they produce. Through hands-on demonstrations, participants will learn about the equipment and tools of the studio, how to achieve consistent sheet formation (from cotton, abaca, and flax fibers), and working with inclusions and pulp painting. Participants can expect to make a stack of handmade paper to bring home.



Paper Techniques

Taught by Nicole Malcolm

February 22-23 | 10:00-4:00 | \$250

Using various Western papermaking techniques-from simple sheet forming to pigmenting pulp-participants will work with a wide range of pulp painting, stencil making, and additions of inclusions (dried flowers, magazine clippings, personal artwork, etc.) to produce images and colors. Beyond simple standard sheet pulling, this workshop will show participants how to add meaning, objects, and dimension to their creations.



Japanese Papermaking

Taught by Michaelle Marschall

March 29-30 | 10:00-4:00 | \$250

Japanese papermaking is an ancient art that is more than 1,300 years old. In this two-day workshop, participants will learn how to create beautiful sheets of washi and will be introduced to traditional and nontraditional processes of making Japanese paper from start to finish. Using kozo grown in The Morgan's garden, participants will learn how to scrape the bark, cook, and beat the fibers to form strong, translucent sheets of paper.

Intro to Letterpress

Taught by R.E.Anderson

February 2 | 10:00-4:00 | \$85

Learn all about Letterpress in this one-day introductory workshop that covers everything from the history of the printing press, terminology, woodblock and metal type collections, different presses at The Morgan, tools of the trade, and general press and studio upkeep. Utilizing what is learned during the workshop, participants will design a poster, set and lock-up type in one of our Vandercook presses, and pull prints of their poster to take home.

Letterpress Possibilities: Pressure Printing & Moveable Type

Taught by Wendy Partridge

March 1-2 | 10:00-4:00 | \$200

This workshop will explore The Morgan's flat-bed cylinder presses and collection of large wood and metal type. Participants will make pieces with handset type and pressure printing imagery (an experimental letterpress technique that is used to create textural effects). The workshop includes a comprehensive introduction to setting type by hand, opportunities to learn alternative letterpress processes, and hands-on operation of The Morgan's Vandercook presses (the workhorses of letterpress printing).



History of Women Printmakers

Taught by Emily Tamulewicz

March 15-16 | 10:00-4:00 | \$200

In this two-day workshop, participants will learn about the world of historical and contemporary Women Printmakers. On day one, enjoy a history lesson and learn how to carve a linoleum block that is inspired by natural themes in the work of the Folly Cove Designers. On day two, set type and add a statement to your piece in the true fashion of Sarah and Mary Katherine Goddard. This workshop incorporates all of the steps from beginning to end: Create a drawing to be translated into a print, carve linoleum, set type, and print. Participants will take home 10-20 copies of their finished work.



Intro to Bookbinding, part I

Taught by R.E.Anderson

January 11 | 10:00-4:00 | \$75

During this introductory workshop, participants will learn about bookbinding's history, terminology, and tools of the trade before learning how to create a basic accordion fold and pamphlet stitch. Building from those forms, participants will explore more complex models that incorporate soft and semi-hardcovers. Participants will expand on and experiment with their newfound skills by making a book of choice during the workshop.



Building Bookbinding Tools

Taught by Joseph Iarocci

January 18 | 10:00-4:00 | \$150

Bring The Morgan Bindery into your home with this workshop! Participants will learn step-by-step techniques for making specialized bookbinding tools. Working with The Morgan's facilities manager, participants will make some of the key tools that every bookbinder requires: punching cradle, punching guide, and sewing frame.



Intro to Bookbinding, part II

Taught by R.E.Anderson

February 15 | 10:00-4:00 | \$75

Building on skills learned in Intro to Bookbinding, part I, participants will delve more deeply into the trade's history, terminology, and tools. By focusing on more complex forms (Coptic Stitch, French Link Stitch with a Kettle Stitch Variation, and Long Stitch with a Link Stitch Variation), participants will gain hands-on experience with tools such as the sewing cradle, PVA, and nipping press. Participants will make personalized bound journals using the forms mentioned above.



Repurposed Books

Taught by R. E. Anderson

March 2 | 10:00-4:00 | \$125

Turn hardbound books into a repurposed book of unique design using The Morgan's collection of spiral-binding punching machines. Using either hardbound books brought in or a book provided by The Morgan, participants will learn how to turn any book into something new and unique. Create a new sketchbook sandwiched between the pages of a classic children's book or a fresh journal from a favorite hardbound calendar. Participants will leave with 2-3 spiral-bound books of their own.



Coptic Bookbinding

Taught by Jennifer Omaitz

March 15 | 10:00-4:00 | \$17

This one-day workshop will introduce basic Coptic stitch binding from cover to cover. Students will learn how to create a small book with single and multiple-needle approaches. These beginning approaches will allow students to master the basic structure and rhythm needed to complete a single book before advancing to more complicated stitch techniques.



Cartonnage: Making Boxes

Taught by Nancy Halbrooks

March 22-23 | 10:00-4:00 | \$250

Participants will begin by exploring simple box structures before moving on to more complex structures that will be covered with decorative paper, rather than traditional fabric. In the nineteenth century, fabrics (which, at that time, were the typical covering used for boxes) became more readily available due to the industrialization of fabric mills. Box making became part of women's home craft/art (embroidery, needlepoint, cross-stitch, and other fabric crafts). Today's expanding interest in making handmade paper and bookbinding/book arts has also increased interest in Cartonnage.

Wild Crafting Paper Dye: Black Walnut

Taught by Anna Chapman

January 4-5 | 10:00-4:00 | \$200

In this workshop, participants will learn how to wild-craft inks and dyes using local natural materials. Black walnut husks will be provided for the class to create a large batch of ink used as a dye bath. Participants-who will be provided with paper from The Morgan-are also encouraged to bring in paper. At the end of the workshop, participants will leave with an 8 oz jar of Black Walnut Ink and resources to help them continue at home.



Intro to Marbling

Taught by Ryan Cermak

February 1 | 10:00-4:00 | \$100

This one-day workshop will cover paper marbling at an introductory level. Participants will be involved in all steps of the process, including reviewing the history of marbling, learning about the tools of the trade, and learning how to prepare the carrageenan. The workshop will include demonstrations of how to create several different traditional marbling patterns before participants explore and utilize the skills they learned. At the end of the workshop, each student will have marbled paper to take home.

In-Person Workshops | MIXED TECHNIQUE



Exploring Encaustics

Taught by Michaelle Marschall

February 8-9 | 10:00-4:00 | \$220

During this two-day workshop, participants will be introduced to a wide variety of basic techniques and tools used in encaustics: building layers of pigmented wax, fusing, embedding, and collaging objects. Students are encouraged to bring-as inclusions-personal items from home and/or drawn or printed imagery as source materials to be used when creating luminous paintings on the prepared board provided by The Morgan.



Modern Marbling

Taught by Jennifer Omaitz

March 8-9 | 10:00-4:00 | \$270

Learn the ancient art of marbling on paper in this intensive workshop. Participants will explore patterns and designs by marbling on a variety of papers, and they also will explore color combinations and marbling techniques through traditional (Ebru) and non-traditional approaches. Marbling consists of suspending inks on a thickened water (carrageenan) bed. These inks are raked through a series of swirls, zig-zags, and other gestures to transform a given design. Students can expect to make at least 12 sheets of marbled paper.

BOOK ARTS

Media Flag/Tag Books with Painted Cover

Taught by Rosemary Rae

February 18 | 5:00-8:00 pm EST | \$75

Create a truly original book: a Mixed Media Flag/Tag book that showcases your painting, collage, and bookmaking techniques. This class is perfect for anyone who is excited to explore a different twist on a creative book structure. Originally created by Hedi Kyle, the traditional flag book has small panels that cross each other when the book opens and closes. In this modified version, all of the panels sit in alignment, and when the book is open, your original, hand-decorated tags are on display.

PRINTMAKING

Origami & Flower Home Printing

Taught by Sato Yamamoto

March 11 | 5:00-8:00 pm EST | \$75

Join Japanese bilingual artist, Sato Yamamoto, in this printmaking workshop that incorporates the tradition of origami and a unique style of art to create dynamic designs and expressive scenic views from the comfort of home. Participants will be walked through the processes to make their own beautiful origami and flower prints in this approachable and stunning process.



MIXED TECHNIQUE

Mechanical Valentines for the Mildly Romantic

Taught by Shawn Sheehy

February 11 | 5:00-7:00 pm EST | \$75

These Valentines probably are better at saying "You are a fun person" rather than "You are my one and only." Either way, join instructor Shawn Sheehy in building this trio of whimsical, animal-based valentines while also learning a bit about the mechanics of paper engineering. This workshop features a kit of pre-cut pieces, so all you need is a couple of hand tools. This class is perfect for beginners and folks looking to incorporate animation into their artist books.



The Sustainable Artist

Taught by Anna Chapman

January 7 & 14 | 5:00-8:00 pm EST | \$150

Sustainability in art has an ancient history and has renewed focus in modern times. With artist Anna Chapman, participants will learn methods for finding, processing, and refining sustainable pigments while also exploring how the artist's relationship to the earth affects their relationship to their work. Explore these themes and methods in this virtual workshop that bursts with originality and passion for the creative.

Words/Matter: Artist Statements & Art's Statements

Taught by Sam Radford

January 21 | 5:00-8:00 pm EST | \$75

Crafting artist statements are a vital part of working in the art world today with the challenge of not only representing your art but yourself as well. Learn how to navigate expressing yourself in your artist statements, how your materials speak about your art, and how to best combine the two in a way most authentic to you. Develop strategies to take advantage of all the opportunities afforded to you and hone your practice to stay true to your art and yourself.

Working with The Morgan's Artist Opportunities Manager, Emily Tamulewicz, participants will review what it takes to stand out from the crowd and craft the best responses when presenting artwork and project proposals.

From Studio to Gallery: Matting, Mounting & Framing Works on Paper

Taught by Celeste Stauber

March 18 & 25 | 5:00-8:00 pm EST | \$150

What does one do after the fun part is completed? Working with The Morgan's Gallery & Store Manager, Celeste Stauber, participants will learn how to best represent pieces for consideration and then pack work for the arduous journey through the postal service. Photographing, group show applications, solo show proposals, and artwork packing/installation instructions will be covered in this informative virtual workshop.

Submitting to Shows & Packing Your Work

Taught by Celeste Stauber

February 4 | 5:00-8:00 pm EST | \$75

In this two-session virtual workshop, participants will learn archival techniques on how to mount and frame works on paper. All common aspects of framing will be covered, including how to choose the correct materials, mounting methods for your artwork, the process of measuring and mounting work to archival matboard, and which type of frame and framing hardware is appropriate for the artwork. There will be demonstrations on operating The Morgan's ProMat Cutter, assembling a metal frame, and adding spacers to metal or wood frames.


